Headteacher's Message

Welcome to the first of our termly Newsletters! I hope these regular updates will provide our school and our community with a summary of what has been achieved each term and to celebrate the successes of our staff and pupils.

It has been a very busy term at Maesteg School for staff and pupils alike. Shakespeare Festival

Maesteg School has many things to celebrate and one of them is the fantastic *BBC School Report* team, led by Miss Jenkins. Our young reporters get to the heart of every story around the school and this term has been no exception. Their report starts with a news story that is the talk of school right now, the formation of the *Maesteg School Parliament...*



Never mind *Brexit*, the most important election this year has been that of our new School Parliament! Maesteg pupils have a new way of expressing their opinions and making sure that all views are heard.

Parliament interviews started at the beginning of the Summer Term. The interviewees had to come up with a professional speech to perform in front of the class explaining their strengths to identify the strongest, most confident and interested candidates. In an interview with the Head Boy, Parliament was described as "a wider variety and diverse range of opinions." Parliament is split into different groups that address different aspects of school life: Health and Wellbeing, Teaching and Learning, Community; Student Support; School Environment and Social Events.

Once a year, usually at the beginning of the school year, Parliament members invite teachers and pupils to speak with them about their rules, roles and decision-making processes within the school, to gain a better and pupil-friendlier understanding of how our school runs. This meeting would only last about 10 to15 minutes after which, the pupils report back to Parliament about their findings.

As part of the 2017 Shakespeare festival, Maesteg School pupils put together a performance of 'A Midsummer Night's Dream.' Despite their busy rehearsal schedule, our *BBC School Reporters* managed to interview the cast and ask them about their experience. The performance took place at *Gnyn Hall* in Neath on the 15th November.

The talented cast worked extremely hard, along with Miss Hillier and Miss Hodge, to produce a humorous performance of the renowned play. While practising for the performance, Miss Hillier said: "I am enjoying rehearsals so far and I think it is a fantastic opportunity for our students because they are all very talented."

For those of you who have never seen the play, the story follows several interconnecting plots involving rebellious daughters, fairy realms and love at first sight. Mia, who plays Queen Hippolyta, summarises the plot for our reporters: "The play, 'A Midsummer Night's Dream' involves four Dukes and Queens falling in love, and there is a king and a queen and some love potion which makes many characters wake up in love with the wrong person." It sounds very complex!



When we spoke to Tyler, who plays one of the young lovers caught up in the magical love potion plot, he said, "My character has to choose between two girls, and I like my character because it's challenging to act like you're in love with someone."

Evan took on a comical role playing one of the Mechanicals. The Mechanicals plan to put on a play for the wedding celebrations of the Duke and the Queen and it seems that when our BBC reporters interviewed Evan, he was enjoying getting into character. "I love that my character is a funny character because I get to express myself."

Natisha was also part of the Mechanical's plot line and she said, "If I could explain my character in one word it would be overconfident because my character believes that he is better than anyone else."

Not only did our pupils have to develop their characterisation skills, but they also had to learn their lines in time for opening night. Harly, who plays Lysander, told us: "I am mostly off script and I read the plot every night so that I can get the feeling of my lines. Even though the language is fairly challenging, I am making progress."

Some of our reporters were involved in the production and on opening night. They said the cast were excited and ready to perform. Staff and parents from Maesteg attended the show to support our aspiring actors and actresses, and they certainly did themselves proud. Congratulations to our dedicated students and staff who were involved.
