Our teachers have gone over and above to ensure that these pupils have every chance of success - there were more revision sessions held during the Easter and half term holidays than ever before, more lunch times sacrificed and more revision materials photocopied! The year 11 prom also saw a record turnout of staff to support our leavers. Summer term has been busy in the M.A.C. base. Pupils have been tending to their crops of tomatoes, cucumber, radish, gooseberries & blueberries. The beautiful weather has meant exceptional growth, with pupils taking extra care to make sure the plants get plenty of water and are located correctly in the polytunnels. After a bumper crop of radish, our M.A.C. pupils created a delicious chutney under the guidance of Miss Way in *Food Technology*. Mrs Jones Headteacher was particularly impressed with the taste of the product and the way it was presented!

This term we were fortunate enough to work with KPC Youth Centre who delivered a series of workshops based around making good decisions, the negative

effects of drugs, social media and alcohol abuse. Pupils took a mature approach, discussing each theme in depth and all qualified for a certificate of recognition for completing the course.

A group of pupils from years 7 & 8 took part in *The Phoenix Project*, run by *South Wales Fire &* Rescue Youth Service. The project involved a physically intense week, testing pupils' endurance, leadership skills and endeavour. Pupils learnt formal yard drill, including how the fire pumps work and how to tackle a fire using the engine's hose. Pupils engaged in several team challenges that included a 'hose run,' problem solving activities, plus a search and rescue activity in the 'dark house.' The pupils acquitted themselves very well and enjoyed their taste of life in the fire service.



M.A.C received a nomination this term from Mrs Matthews for the *BCBC Inspired for Life Innovation' Award 2018*. The nomination was put forward for the opportunities and experiences that MAC provides our pupils. We are delighted to announce that M.A.C. won the award and were presented with their trophy at *Porthcavl Pavillion* on Thursday 12th July.

The experience provided to the children is something that they will never forget, with pupils learning skills that will serve them for life. 

On Wednesday 13th June, two lucky pupils from BBC School Report, Isobel and Lucy, travelled up to Westminster to attend an event at the House of Commons to further explore the topic of Fake News. The pupils were invited to attend the report launch by the National Literacy Trust who have been conducting research surrounding this important topic. The published report outlines some of the ways in which Fake News is being talked about in schools and how we can help pupils identify this in their navigation of the internet. After receiving the invitation, Lucy said, "I was really excited at the thought of going to London and being part of such an important event."

At the *House of Commons*, Lucy and Isobel were part of a varied audience made up of school teachers, journalists and employees of online media outlets. The final report revealed that only 2% of children have the critical literacy skills they need to tell if a news story is real or fake. After hearing the results of the survey and a presentation from guest speaker Mariella Frostrup, Isobel and Lucy had the opportunity to interview a number of the guests attending the event and even caught up with Mariella to get her views on a topic that they have been learning so much about.

They quizzed Mariella about her career in journalism and managed to get some top

tips for our *BBC Report Team* in Maesteg School. When asked what advice Mariella would give young aspiring journalists, she said "have confidence in your own opinions and your own judgements. Sometimes it is quite hard. People try to put you down, people make you feel unsure about what you're thinking and you have to really build up your own confidence to support whatever it is that you think and you want to know about and you consider important."

Chris Elmore, Ogmore MP, was also at the event and was keen to discuss the topic with our reporters. Lucy asked what he thought we could do to help tackle this problem in our area. He replied, "I think we have to challenge it and we have to make sure that people understand that these things aren't true and that people will invent things." Whilst Chris Elmore was certain that he hadn't shared any Fake News stories, he asked Isobel and Lucy to check his Twitter to make sure that his stories were reliable.

After a busy day at parliament, the pupils returned home to feed back everything that they had learnt to the team back at *Maesteg School.* Isobel said, "it was a once in a life time experience and we not only got to interview the local MP but we were also given the chance to interview Mariella Frostrup, a famous journalist who gave brilliant advice for young writers like us."

Radio Times!

After the success of our *BBC* News at 6 feature with Sian Lloyd, our trail blazing *BBC School Report* team were asked to join Lynn Bowles on *Radio 2* to discuss the work they have been doing surrounding fake news. Miss Jenkins said "although Lucy had never been on the radio before, she was confident and didn't let the microphones and recording equipment phase her. 36 Maesteg School pupils shook the world of dance this month by winning the UDOIT! UK National School Championships, making the National news

in the process!

Maesteg School entered both the Junior and Senior categories of the Wales Street Dance finals at Sophia Gardens in March 2018, where we gained the title of Wales Schools Champions for both Senior and Junior competitions. Pupils combined Waacking, Street and Funkstyles to create a winning formula, prompting praise from the judges and qualification for the national competition in Stoke-On-Trent.

Our dance troupes met with Wales Commonwealth athletes at Sophia Gardens during the competition, soaking up the incredible atmosphere whilst rubbing shoulders with the country's top performers.



In preparation for the finals in Stoke, pupils committed to a strict training regime, accumulating 20+ hours a week in order to perfect and refine their routines. All of our pupils played their part in the choreography of both Senior and Junior routines but special mention must go to Tomas Edmund (Yr.13) for his fantastic leadership skills in the build-up to the competition.

The Junior's dance troupe, performing as Intensity and

the Seniors as Overload embraced the finals with the same character and determination as in Sophia Gardens, thoroughly enjoying the experience of the competition.

The celebrity judges, including Big Chris' from Flawless, were running strength and technique workshops, a fantastic

opportunity for all pupils, which helped calm the nerves before their performances.

Ashton Goldsworthy (Yr.9) was confident that Intensity could do well in the finals. "I felt nervous as we arrived at the centre but we had prepared our routine well," said Ashton.
