Girl Power: CISCO Technology Triumph >>> Briar Cannon, Tilia-May Gajda & India Williams of year 8 visited Cisco HQ in London this term to take on Computer Science challenges alongside other schools from across the country.

Our fantastic year 8 girls were given a *microbot* with coding instructions and told to make the bot move! *Maesteg School's* team triumphed

attention 'across the pond' in the US. *Mrs Scudamore* & *Mrs Scarr* answered questions for TV radio and the published pre-

questions for TV, radio and the published press, explaining that the vision was to make *Prom* "affordable for everyone." Pupil *Tegan McNamara* visited the *ITV* studios to represent the school and share the heart-warming story with viewers, whilst our *BBC School Report Team* reported from prom night. Here's what *Olivia Castle & Katie Pritchard* found out: 'On Thursday 27th of June our year 11's celebrated the end of their academic year. They had a beautiful prom that took place in *The Exchange Hotel* in *Cardiff*. The *Pop-Up Prom Shop* team had collected over 300 dresses to donate to year 11 pupils who either struggled finding a dress that suited them or were hampered by financial restraints. This year, 10 dresses were snapped up on the night but *Mrs Scudamore* has said "Next year and many years after, we will open the shop earlier so pupils can take time to choose a dress, we'll have a wider selection that will hopefully include suits too."

'The pupils and teachers who wore the donated dresses were extremely happy with their choice of outfit and looked absolutely incredible. The prom night as a whole was a huge success and the pupils and teachers quite literally had a ball! Our school was the 2nd school prom that *The* Exchange Hotel has hosted and staff there said that our pupils were exceptionally well behaved and were a pleasure to host...even the teachers were well behaved! We interviewed Mrs Scarr about the prom and she asserted "The prom was a fantastic event with the majority of year 11 pupils attending. It was a lovely atmosphere and I am so proud to see year 11 celebrate the end of their educational year." After our Pop-up Prom Shop was aired on the BBC, child commissioners who are part of the Welsh Government came in and spoke to some pupils and teachers about our initiative. She hopes to influence other schools to adopt some of our ideas and has now decided that many more schools should endorse the Pop-Up Prom Shop vision. Our report has been shared in many schools as far as New York City, as a prom is a big celebration in The States that costs families huge amounts of money. Schools in the US have taken notice of Maesteg School's venture and would like to start prom shops in their schools as well - what an achievement and victory for encouraging inclusion and repurposing a perfectly wearable dress!'

Our **BBC School Report Team** (who have put in a great shift this term!) were on hand yet again to report on the event. This report is brought to you by Lowri Davies, Lucy Davies & Chloe Rees:

Cows on Tour was all about participation and the day revolved around interesting activities connected to agriculture farming and livestock. We took particular interest in the livestock section, as it consisted of cows, goats, sheep, chickens and sheep dogs! "My favourite part was petting the goats! I found out that goats' milk can help people with allergies" asserted *Lily* from year 7. As part of the event, it was important that the year 7's got to learn where some of their everyday foods come from. This also included looking closely at the materials their clothes originate from and how they are manufactured into different garments. For example, during the day, a demonstration took place where the *Cows on Tour* team showed us how to shear a sheep and the importance of shearing a sheep in a specific way without harming them or yourself. The highly qualified workers showed the year 7's how to shear the sheep perfectly, as Jack, a year 7, told us that the sheep "Need to be sheared otherwise their thick amount of wool will attract bugs," which seemed to fascinate him as well as many others. After a demonstration with the sheep, it was time to watch a cow being milked. The team used a suction device to transport the milk from the udders into a jar. They told the children that if the cow has a disease, they need to be hand milked the natural way to stop any disturbances, to ease the process, and to ensure the milk is as fresh as possible. We gathered feedback from many pupils who participated in the day and they all have told us that their knowledge on livestock in the agricultural industry has expanded exceedingly!
