## UNIFORM POLICY <br> 

At Maesteg School, we require pupils to wear our uniform. School uniform gives pupils a sense of community and instils pride in our school. It contributes to our ethos and sets the tone for hard work - 'Motivated to Strive', and 'Respect' supporting positive behaviour.

We have developed our school uniform in consultation with pupils, parents and governors. A full consultation of views and concerns will take place before any amendments are made to this policy. Our Governing Body includes parents and representatives from the community who contribute to decisions that are made in the best interests of our pupils, our families and our school. We work hard to raise the aspirations of our school community and have high expectations of the children who attend Maesteg School. We have carefully considered the uniform design, availability and sustainability so that parents continue to get value for money when sourcing and purchasing uniform.

[^0]This policy is available on the school website and in the Parents' Handbook so that parents have clear guidance on uniform well in advance of the admission of their child. We also discuss our uniform during our visits to primary schools in the summer term before pupils start in year 7 .

## Equal Opportunities

We seek to make appropriate arrangements to reflect the requirements of different religious faiths concerning acceptable variations of the school uniform. We are sensitive to and demonstrate a respect for the needs of different cultures, races and religions, and their needs are accommodated within this policy.

## Branded Items

Welsh Government have strongly encouraged schools to minimise costs further by reducing the number of branded school logo items required. Although the school would prefer jumpers and/or blazers branded with the Maesteg School logo, this is not compulsory to enable parents to shop in high street stores.

## Uniform 'Swap Shop'

Maesteg School has a uniform swap shop which we encourage all parents and pupils to use. Once items of uniform have been outgrown, they can be donated to the swap shop in exchange for a larger size.

To promote a healthy lifestyle, our uniform does not preclude walking or cycling to school. We encourage pupils to wear light colours and reflective materials over their uniform, so that they are as visible as possible when walking or cycling to school during the winter months.

## Representations about uniform requirements

If any parent has any concerns regarding uniform, they are very welcome to contact the school's Pastoral Office to discuss school uniform. Procedure in the Event of Non-Compliance We investigate non-compliance with the uniform policy case by case. We may impose sanctions for breach of the uniform policy. The Progress Leader or Assistant Headteacher will deal with persistent nonwearing of school uniform and defiance of uniform rules.

We may ask a pupil to go home to change their clothes. This will be for no longer than is necessary to effect the change of clothing and would only be appropriate where the change could be made quickly and easily. In such cases, parents will be notified. We will always bear in mind the age, vulnerability of the child and availability of a parent. Parents are also invited to being uniform to school. Exclusion is not usually an appropriate response to breaches of this policy except where it is clear that pupils are non-compliant or persistent and defiant in relation to the wearing of correct school uniform

## Uniform September 2023

School uniform will be worn whenever pupils are on site at Maesteg School. This includes the journey to and from school, and on school visits as required.
